# **President Message**

Hello to all members of the society! Although it's intimidating to follow in the footsteps of Mary Pitch, I am honored to serve as your new society president. I look to, and rely on, Mary, the other officers, and all members of the society for guidance as we move forward.

I've just returned from a week in Sacramento, California at the National Genealogical Society's (NGS) Family History Conference: Our American Mosaic. The conference was the first large in-person genealogy event I've attended since 2020. It was wonderful to see people I've only previously met online, and attend educational sessions in person. The hour-long teaching lectures covered every genealogy topic you can imagine, from beginner to advanced levels. I attended sessions on writing, Irish research, using timelines, using maps, analyzing evidence, and more. Every session provides new ideas and a renewed energy for busting brick walls and improving your personal research. In addition to the educational lectures, highlights of the conference included a screening of the documentary film "Far East Deep South," about a San Francisco family of Chinese descent's journey to find out more about their grandfather and great grandfather who died in Mississippi. A presentation from Family Search's David Ouimette about the company's quest and respectful efforts to digitize records around the world; in some cases, helping with cultural preservation in endangered communities. And a keynote banquet presentation from NGS board member Andre Kearns about his personal genealogy journey, and NGS' initiative for diversity, equity, and inclusion.

In Montana, we are lucky to have two top speakers from the NGS conference coming to speak at our Montana State Genealogy Conference in September at Fairmont Hot Springs Resort. Judy Russell, JD, CG, CGL is one of the most well-known genealogist lecturers in the U.S., specializing in law, legal records, methodology, DNA, and more. Rich Venezia is an expert in researching immigrant ancestors, dual citizenship for Ireland and Italy, and federal and naturalization records. I highly encourage you to plan to attend this conference! Besides learning genealogy research methods and tips, it's a fun opportunity to meet and connect with other genealogists in Montana. The location at Fairmont makes it much more affordable than traveling to an out-of-state conference. Fairmont is offering group rates of \$139 – 169 per night for single to quadruple occupancy. ## MT DEATH INDEX CD - UPDATE-2008-2012

The Montana State Genealogical Society has created a 3rd Montana State Death Index CD that covers deaths in the State from 2008 to 2012. This update is available for a price of \$10. The 2nd CD for years 2003-2007 is still available for \$10. This will be a great addition to the original CD, which covers all the deaths reported to the State from the 1800s through 2002. Most of the records give the person's age and the county where they died. The data is in Microsoft ACCESS format in 10 year searchable increments if you don't know exact information. Included on the CD is a current list of Montana Counties, their numbers, and addresses. There is a helpful "read-me" file that explains some of the intricacies of the database. # My Cousin Wasn't a Good Public Speaker

While searching Chronicling America for relatives, I enjoyed reading a couple articles for more than just mention of kinfolk. Some aspects of the stories may be viewed as sensationalism or politics as usual that haven't changed in 130 years.

An article in the Morris (Minnesota) Tribune of October 7, 1896 was about addresses given to the Silver Club by a political office-seeker with no tact and my cousin, several times removed, who was not much of an orator.

My relative, G.A. Westphal, "opened the ceremonies with an address, which did not amount to much, as he is neither a speech maker nor a plain talker and failed to make an impression. He claimed to not be posted on the financial question, and before he got through talking, his audience found out that he was not very well posted on anything else."

The person for whom Westphal opened, a Mr. Dobbyn "is rated among our leading orators, but despite his stirring eloquence and his artistic postures, he is found wanting to a large degree in the knack of vote getting. Instead of holding his audience and interesting them, he disgusts them with his uncalled-for abuse on his opponents and more than half leave before he has finished speaking. He made no argument, brought out no points, nor neither did he attempt to. His sole object appeared to be to heap abuse upon the heads of the opposing party, and in fact on everybody who were so unfortunate as not to be burdened with his own individual way of thinking."

Evidently the Silver Club was as unimpressed as the reporter as "The club took up a collection to defray the expenses of a noted speaker to be here next month."

## My Grandfather the Sheriff

My third great-grandfather, Nels Paulsrud, was Polk County, MN sheriff for several years until his death in May of 1890. As the county had no jail of its own, he traveled often to transport lawbreakers from and to the county seat of Crookston and places that had room to incarcerate them.

As reported in the St. Paul Globe, one of his trips was to Duluth.

"Elopers Clutched by the Law"

Duluth, Minn, May 2. -- Agnes Gabon, aged thirty, and Frank Perie, about twenty-one years of age, an eloping couple from Crookston, were arrested yesterday in a room back of Kent's liquor store. The woman was charged with deserting her family, and Perie was arrested charged with stealing goods and money to the value of \$175. They were taken back to Crookston by Sheriff Paulsrud of Polk County.

Grandpa Paulsrud was one of the witnesses of a hanging in Otter Tail County that was reported in great (excruciating?) detail in the St. Paul Daily Globe of April 14, 1890. The murderer sentenced to death "...Killed a Girl of Sixteen and Fed Her Body to the Hogs."

The article devotes several columns to the construction of "THE SCAFFOLD. Where the Murderer Yielded Up His Life", including scale drawings with labeling letters that further explained the components, including "H: position of sheriff when he adjusted the knot and pulled the lever." One paragraph heading was "SHERIFF BRANDENBURG. The Man Whose Iron Hand Sprung the Trap." Another heading was "BY STRANGULATION. The Long Drop Fails to Break the Prisoner's Neck."

Ghoulish rubbernecking is not just a modern TV phenomenon. "Sheriff Brandenburg has been beset for tickets for the last week from all sorts of people. They have begged for them, teased for them, and bullied for them. The finest opera on earth could not have called out such a perfect furor of anxiety to get places to see it. Letters by the score from all over the state have been received, mostly with no stamps enclosed, pleading for tickets to the hanging. In spite of all the pressure brought to bear, the sheriff has steadily adhered to his determination not to make a show of the affair..."
