

MT DEATH INDEX CD - UPDATE-2008-2012

The Montana State Genealogical Society has created a 3rd Montana State Death Index CD that covers deaths in the State from 2008 to 2012. This update is available for a price of \$10. The 2nd CD for years 2003-2007 is still available for \$10. This will be a great addition to the original CD, which covers all the deaths reported to the State from the 1800s through 2002. Most of the records give the person's age and the county where they died. The data is in Microsoft ACCESS format in 10 year searchable increments if you don't know exact information. Included on the CD is a current list of Montana Counties, their numbers, and addresses. There is a helpful "read-me" file that explains some of the intricacies of the database. She is creating an excel spreadsheet of the obituaries that were in the file so that we can include it in our databases. She is also working on Find A Grave and contributing them to the website if they were not included.

Last week I visited with Pete and Maureen Strazdas. They are still digitizing at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints on 6th Avenue. At this time, they are working on documents from the Grand Lodge of Masons Library on North Park Ave. Remember if you know of any collections that you feel should be digitized, let me know. It takes awhile for the paperwork to be approved by FamilySearch.

They have finished with digitizing records for St Paul's United Methodist Church.

Mary, Dennis and I met with Suzanne at the Lewis & Clark Library to test our computers for the upcoming Genealogy Open house. We learned that if you are in the library working and using their wireless network, one does not need a library card. This is a huge benefit as Ancestry Library is the world version. To sign on: *hookup to the wireless account LCLpublic, do not connect automatic or it will not work. *go to Iclibrary.org. *Pause over research and choose genealogy. *Click on Ancestry. Happy researching.

What brick walls are you trying to research? What is causing the barrier?

- Parents of Samuel Walker born in New Jersey in 1749. Lack of vital records and online resources. Parents of Salome Sarah Buckley (1777-1859) of Philadelphia. Needs onsite research. Parents for Ellen Lynch of Saint Paul, MN (1839-1915) barriers are common name, lack of records, Irish research.
- Identifying where I connect with a DNA match, a black woman that I think descends from my great grandfather's family who were slave holders.
- Locating my Great Grandpa's family. I cannot find anything on my Great grandpa prior to 1911- 1914 even DNA hasn't helped.
- My maternal grandmother born in Czech Republic (have not found her parents or siblings)
- I can't find when one of my past forefathers came from Germany. I have a lot on him, but it only starts at a certain date 1700's era.
- Maternal line. Barrier is caused by common names Mary Jones, William Jones, Tom Shields, Bridget Jones, Bridget Shields etc. and common locations and immigration history.
- DNA as want to tie to other family.
- Unable to find acceptable proof of my great grandparents to use for example to join DAR.
- Particular ancestors; other people on Ancestry have not researched these folks
- My grandfather was a chemist for the government during WWI and II. I would like to find out more about his service. Many military records burned in the records warehouse in St. Louis in 1973. I have found his draft cards, but nothing else related to his service.
- Time
- I have a line in Pennsylvania that just disappeared & a great great grandfather who disappeared also. Miami County, Ohio is a huge barrier.

- Need help navigating Newspaper.com more fully. I have a very old newspaper copy of an obituary of a grandfather from Kansas, and even though subscribed one year to "Extra" research detail on this site, I cannot find this.
- Breaks between some of the generations
- Where in Ireland my 3x's great grandparents were born, married. Where in Virginia a 2x's great grandfather was born.
- Female relatives living in 1800-1900
- Both of my Prussian and German lines are hard to break
- My 4th and 5th generations in Ireland
- Southeastern Kentucky my maternal family line.
- Many times the same names are used; i.e., my husband's Irish stream began with John & Mary Dever. Then they had a son named John, who had a son named John. Gets a bit confusing. Also, hit a brick wall in finding out dates of birth, death, marriage, etc. for the first John & Mary mentioned above. Can't seem to delve deeper.
- My great grandmother has been impossible. No family stories or documentation as to her parents, how she arrived in 1895 in Colorado. Old family group sheet (LDS) noted adopted. Ancestry Thru Lines suggests her mother's name - possibly an out of wedlock baby? That mother's name never married. Now to PROVE thru DNA?
